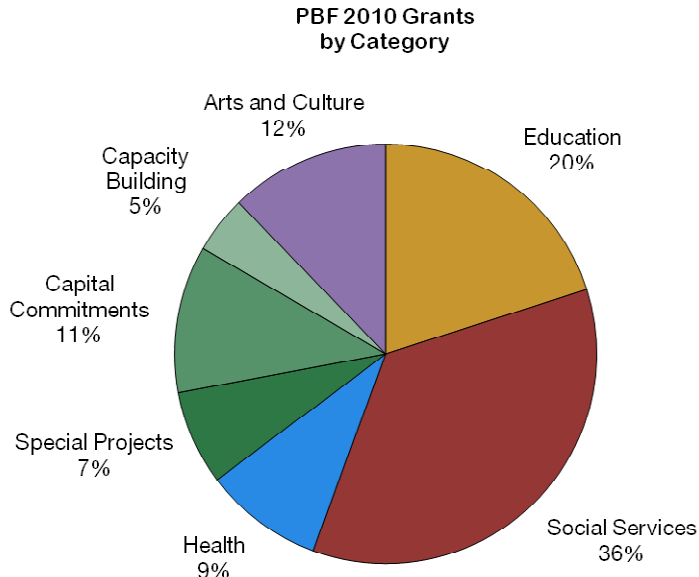

Welcome to the Polk Bros. Foundation's 2010 online Annual Report.

As we did last year, we are keeping our costs down by producing this report in-house and providing an online list of grants made in our 2009-2010 fiscal year rather than a printed report. Our dedicated board and staff have worked hard to maintain the level of support Polk Bros. Foundation grants provide to nearly 350 organizations each year. The reduction in our grants from \$22,500,000 in FY09 to just under \$20,000,000 this year is due largely to our decision not to make new capital grants in 2009 and 2010.

We have continued our significant support for work we admire and believe in, such as community schools, school-based health centers, work to preserve affordable rental housing for low-income Chicagoans, and housing programs that employ the harm-reduction model to keep vulnerable people housed. We continue to provide



funding for arts programs that work with Chicago public school teachers and students over time, to help teachers engage students with diverse learning styles, enhance lessons in a variety of subjects and build student attachment to school. Our grantees do a great deal of work with limited resources and we are in awe of their efforts and results.

And now we look to the future with optimism as our assets begin the slow climb back to pre-2008 levels. Change will be gradual but we look forward to reaching out to grantees and experts in the fields we support as we begin to think about new initiatives. We are proud to support the essential work of our grantees and we applaud their resilience. We are hopeful that we can work together for even more impressive outcomes in the coming years.
